Ordinary objects-tables and chairs, white cotton shirts, roses, candles, blades of grass-become the totems for the victims of drug wars and corrupt governments, and the acts of violence carried out against them. For the brave, deeply poetic resonance of her decades-long career, she's been awarded the Nasher Sculpture Center's inaugural Nasher Prize. Salcedo was chosen by a jury that included Okwui Enwezor, Steven Nash, Nicholas Serota and Phyllida Barlow, and will receive the award-designed by Renzo Piano-and the \$100,000 prize at a gala in April.
